1. The proposed speed limit change will affect the following streets:

Bloomfield Road	Whole Length
Cairngorm Close	Whole Length
Cheviot Road	Whole Length
Copinger Road	Whole Length
Grampian Close	Whole Length
Heathcott Road	Whole Length
Whittier Road	Whole Length

- 2 These proposals are part of a programme of new 20mph zones which has been confirmed by the City Mayor. Money has been set aside by the Council from the Integrated Capital Programme to pay for these changes. It is estimated that the cost of the scheme will be £30,000.
- 3 If this proposal is approved, then the change is likely to come into force during the summer 2016.
